Community Health and Well-Being Grants. ideas42 is currently soliciting applications from communities who are tackling challenging problems in community health and well-being, and who are interested in learning how the field of behavioral science, which provides deeper insights into how people make decisions and take actions, can be used to develop better solutions to these problems. Interested communities will designate an organization or consortium of organizations to submit the application on their behalf. Health and well-being are greatly influenced by where we live, how and where. Many communities struggle to encourage the individual actions needed to address these factors, even when residents are motivated and when there are existing health initiatives in place.

However, new tools from the behavioral sciences can be very effective at helping people make better decisions and follow through on good intentions. By learning how to apply behavioral insights, communities can improve the effectiveness of initiatives that encourage healthy behaviors, tackle social and economic challenges, and work to transform access to care. We encourage any community working on these or related issues to apply. Selected applicants will be invited to attend an intensive workshop on applying behavioral science to advance community health and well-being. In addition, a small number of applicants who attend the workshop will be selected to partner with ideas42 to design and test behavioral interventions in their communities. Nonprofit Legal Clinic: Understanding Contracts. The D.C. Bar Pro Bono Center is hosting the Nonprofit Legal Clinic: Understanding Contracts workshop on June 1 from 9 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at Morrison & Foerster, 2000 Pennsylvania Avenue NW. If your nonprofit organization rents office space, hires a fundraising consultant, or signs a grant agreement with a foundation, then your nonprofit is party to one or more contracts. Perhaps you've renewed your organization's lease multiple times, or have reused the same template when contracting for services from a consultant. You may have inherited a contract that was first written several years ago or signed a contract with a vendor you've been doing business with for years without really reading it, because you assume nothing has changed. But how well do you really understand your contracts? For example, do you know whether your organization's contracts contain: a promise to maintain certain types of insurance?; a provision that requires you to complete your annual audit by a specific date?; or an arbitration clause? If you don't understand all the provisions of your organization's contracts, you may be promising more than your organization can take on. At this clinic, co-sponsored by the D.C. Bar Pro Bono Center and Morrison & Foerster LLP, you will meet one-on-one with an attorney who will help review your existing contracts to ensure that you understand all the provisions that they contain, and to help you develop. Nonprofit Legal Clinic: Understanding the Building Blocks of Good Governance . The D.C. Bar Pro Bono Center is hosting Nonprofit Legal Clinic: Understanding the Building Blocks of Good Governance workshop on June 10, 2016 from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Kirkland & Ellis, 655 15th Street NW, Suite 1200. Good governance policies are a critical part of every organization's foundation, which is why the IRS Form 990 asks nonprofits to indicate whether they have conflict-of-interest, whistleblower and record retention policies. The IRS also has requirements regarding conflicts of interest and public disclosure of your tax filings, while the D.C. Nonprofit Code requires a nonprofit to maintain certain corporate records. But what should you do if: Someone comes to your office and demands to see a copy of your original IRS application for exempt status – do you have to give a copy to the person requesting one? What if you can't find it? or An ex-employee who left your employ eight years ago asks for a copy of his or her personnel file - should you provide it? While all Sec. 501(c)(3) organizations should have well-drafted conflict of interest, record retention and whistleblower polices, it is just as important that organizations educate their directors, employees and volunteers about the policies and develop a plan to implement them. At this clinic, you will meet one-on-one with an attorney who will help review and update your nonprofit's whistleblower

and record retention policies and your conflict of interest policy and disclosure form. The attorney will also discuss with you the reasons the policies say what they do, and how best to implement them. Finally, the attorney will discuss with you some actions you can take now, so you know to handle issues when they come up.
