D.C. Commission on the Arts and Humanities Grants. D.C. Commission on the Arts and Humanities (DCCAH) released guidelines for five new funding opportunities - the Arts Stabilization Grant, the Sister Cities International Arts Grant, the Arts and Healing Grant, Special Project Funding Opportunities, and the second round of the Community Arts Grant. These grant programs are only open to artists and arts organizations that are based in the District of Columbia. The Arts Stabilization Grant (ASG) provides one-time general operating support to established arts and humanities organizations that support the sustainability of the District of Columbia's creative economy. Eligible organizations must be established in the District for a minimum of seven (7) years. The maximum request for ASG is \$250,000. Computers for Learning. Apply for a chance to receive computers and related equipment from Computers for Learning for your school or educational nonprofit. In order to advocate and promote the reuse of computers, the General Service Administration is proud to sponsor the new re-engineered Computers for Learning (CFL) website. The CFL program assists federal agencies to meet the requirements of Executive Order (EO) 12999, "Educational Technology: Ensuring Opportunity for All Children in the Next Century". The EO directs agencies, to the extent permitted by law, to give highest preference to schools and nonprofit organizations, including



community-based educational organizations, (schools and educational nonprofit organizations) with the transfer, through gift or donation, of computers and related peripheral equipment excess to their needs. The CFL program allows schools and educational nonprofit organizations to view and select the computer equipment that federal agencies have reported as excess.
