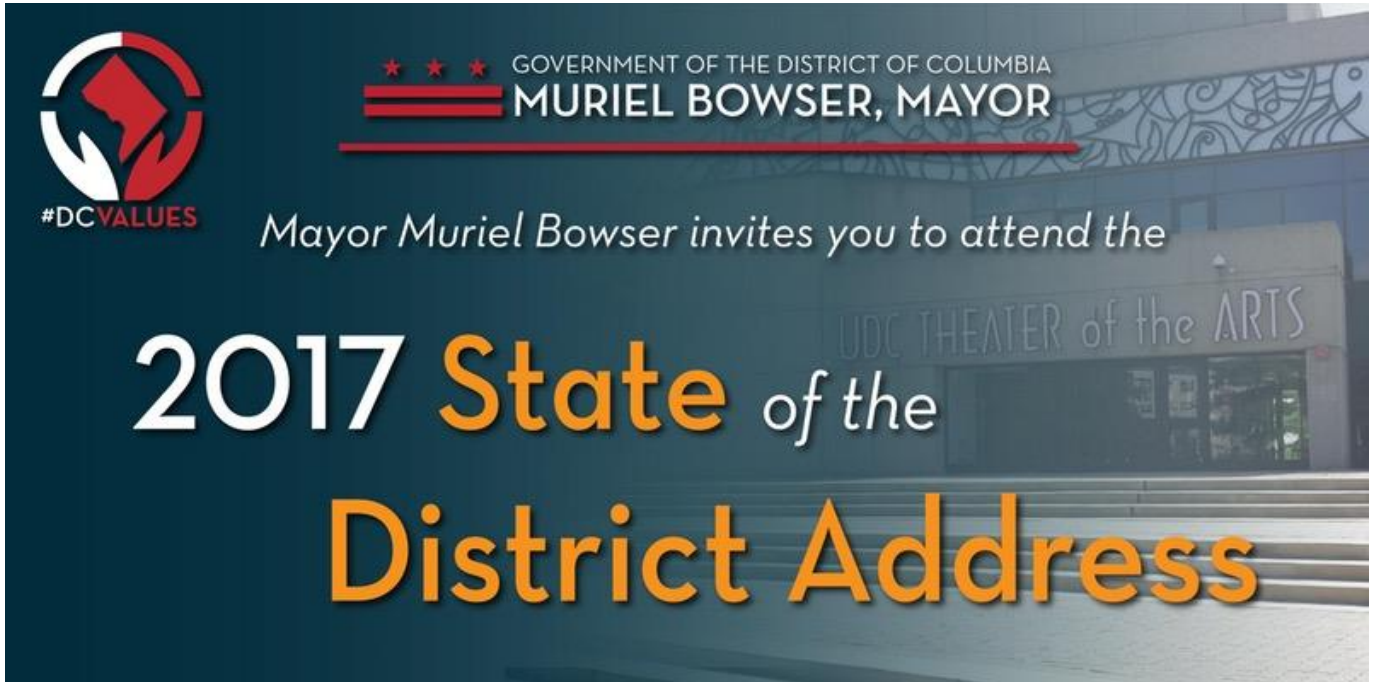

Free Intellectual Property Legal Clinic for Nonprofits. The D.C. Bar Pro Bono Center is hosting a Free Intellectual Property Legal Clinic for Nonprofits and invites your organization to participate. The clinic will assist nonprofit groups with basic intellectual property issues, including trademarks, copyrights, and licensing. The clinic is scheduled for Friday, April 28, 2017 from 9 am to 11:30 am at Kilpatrick Townsend & Stockton LLP, 607 14th Street, NW. The program will be divided into two parts: a short presentation on the basics of intellectual property law as it applies to your nonprofit; and a one-on-one meeting (approximately one hour) between your organization and attorneys who specialize in intellectual property law. The attorneys will review the IP needs of your nonprofit with you. Issues that will be reviewed include: your nonprofit's name and logos - are they properly protected?; your nonprofit's program materials - who prepared them, who owns the rights to use and change them, and what you should do to protect them?; licensing agreements between you and a third party - how do they work?; and the organization's website - is it legally compliant? 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Extensive 8-Week Proposal Writing Course. The Mayor's Office of Partnerships and Grant Services (OPGS) in partnership with The Magi Group, LLC will offer a proposal writing course for District of Columbia Government and Nonprofit grant and program managers. Only nonprofits operating for at least one year are eligible to apply. **Consultants and contractual staff working for nonprofits are not eligible to apply. NO EXCEPTIONS.** This course is designed for both intermediate and experienced grant and program managers. The course combines expert instructions, with practical exercises, to take you step-by-step through all the stages of planning programs, locating funding sources, and writing grant proposals. The class selection is very competitive and limited to one participant per organization. OPGS staff will conduct site visits of all nonprofit programs before selections are made. Class fees will be covered by OPGS. This is a very popular course and it is important that all participants are able to commit to attend every session. The Board Leadership Award. Applications are now available for the Center for Nonprofit Advancement's Board Leadership Award which was developed with support from area experts to recognize and spotlight outstanding leadership from Boards of Directors of Washington-area nonprofit organizations. The award recognizes the role that boards play in building and sustaining successful organizations by executing their fiduciary and leadership responsibilities—assuring that they are well led, well supported and responsive to the people and communities they serve. Two organizations' Board of Directors will be selected as the Center for Nonprofit Advancement's 2017 Board Leadership Award winners—one for an organization with an annual budget under \$2 million and one for an organization with an annual budget over \$2 million. Call for Community Grant Reviewer. Serve DC in the Mayor's Office on Volunteerism is seeking reviewers for its 2017 AmeriCorps State Formula Grant Competition. Grant reviewing is an excellent opportunity to network with colleagues in the national service field, learn more about the grant-making process, develop your grant-writing skills, and contribute your knowledge and experience to Serve DC's efforts to select high-quality Washington, DC-based programs for AmeriCorps funding. Grant reviewers read, score, and evaluate applications for the 2017 AmeriCorps State Formula Grant Competition. The panel then comes to a consensus to rank the applications and recommends them for the next level of review. This is a volunteer opportunity.
