Income Maintenance Administration (IMA)

Deadline: May 10, 2006

Mini-Subgrants to Small Non-Profit Community-Based Organizations

The District has grant funds available for eligible organizations to provide community-based services. This funding is available under the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 for the provision of services and activities which directly benefit TANF customers or low income families with children and household incomes of less than or equal to 200 percent of the federal poverty line. Multiple awards will be made to support the work of eligible organizations. The grants, in amounts of up to \$20,000, will be awarded to fund one or more services or activities offered by an applicant organizations.

Family Services Administration (FSA)

Deadline: May 18, 2006

Community Services Block Grant—Family Strengthening Initiative

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) Program is a federally funded anti-poverty program. Through this RFA, DHS is seeking applications from community-based organizations to fund programs and activities which will positively impact the wellbeing of low-income youth and their families in the District of Columbia. This RFA will target low-income youth 5 –11 years of age and their families who are experiencing high levels of stressors/crises which negatively impact family functioning. Applicants should present program models which will provide opportunities for low-income youth and their families to address barriers to family stability through services and supports which target the following: employment, housing, program coordination and linkages, education, emergency services, self-sufficiency, income management, nutrition and health. DHS is seeking to award five to six grants with maximum budgets not to exceed \$100,000 per award.

Early Care and Education Administration (ECEA)

Deadline: May 19, 2006

Out-of-School Time for Children from Limited English Proficient Asian, African and Latino Newcomer Communities

The ECEA seeks applications from qualified community-based and faith-based organizations to provide out-of-school time programs to children through 18 years of age. The target populations for the out-of-school time program are: (1) Children from Limited English Proficient Asian and African Newcomer Communities; and (2) Children from Limited English Proficient Latino Newcomer Community. The ECEA is committed to improving the quality and expanding the supply of child care providers in the District of Columbia. ECEA is also committed to enhance access to child care services for families from limited-English proficient Asian, African and Latino newcomer communities, particularly during out-of-school time. Through community-based programs, ECEA seeks to enrich the experience of children from limited-English proficient Asian, African and Latino newcomer communities, and deter them from engaging in negative activities during out-of-school time. The ECEA intends to award multiple grant awards for a total of up to \$1,800,000 for Out-of-School Time Services for children from limited English proficient Asian, African and Latino Newcomer Communities through a competitive grant process in fiscal year (FY) 2006..

Income Maintenance Administration (IMA)

Deadline: May 31, 2006

Teen Pregnancy Prevention and a Social Marketing Campaign

According to the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy, the United States has the highest rate of teen pregnancy and births in the western industrialized world. Despite a 30% overall decline in births to teens between 1991 and 2001, fueled, in part, by publicly funded efforts, the birth rate among black and Hispanic teens remains higher than for other groups. Moreover, the rate of teen pregnancy among Hispanics exceeds that for all U.S. teens. DHS intends to make several awards to fund organizations that will provide a community based teen pregnancy prevention program. In addition, DHS intends to make a single grant award to operate a social marketing campaign delivering teen pregnancy prevention and abstinence messages. The total amount available for the grants is \$ 1.3 million.

District of Columbia Fatherhood Initiative (DCFI)

In the District of Columbia, it is the obligation of public and private entities and the government to do our part in removing the barriers to positive male involvement and reduce fatherlessness and unplanned births. As a result of the positive strides made on behalf of the mothers who are low-income or on TANF, we feel it is time to devote the same effort to our fathers in the District of Columbia. The objective of this effort is to provide a holistic approach to service delivery that will meet the needs of fathers and their families to ensure that fathers have the fundamental skills necessary to contribute to the financial, emotional and social development of their children. In addition, the programs and services offered attempt to remove the many environmental barriers (economic, educational, employment, etc.) that negatively impact a father's involvement and support with his family and child(ren). DHS will make available approximately \$1,295,000.00 in funding for this program with the intention of making multiple awards.
